


# Hillwood Pathmates An Introduction to a Public Art Project


Hillwood Neighborhood in Shoreline re-branded in 2020 and has kept their retired 24" x 36" aluminum street signs to re-purpose them into small, silhouette-style sculptures to be installed along our four most-used neighborhood paths. The theme for subject matter is *What I Like About My Neighborhood*.

Designs created by youth in grades K-12 will be solicited through art programs in our schools, through a variety of social media platforms, through postings in our libraries, and through word-of-mouth. The Hillwood Neighborhood Association will be selecting eight designs suited to this medium. The eight young artists whose designs are chosen will each be awarded \$100 for their original designs. We will be distributing a Call for Artists with all the specific guidelines as soon as our grant application is approved (fingers crossed!).




Eight 24"x 36" heavy gauge aluminum panels will be repurposed into public art designed by our youth. The panels have holes as shown, and can be designed either horizontally or vertically. Designs submitted should be drawn so that they suit the medium of cut sheet metal. The designs shown here are for examples only!

Designs can include a lot of detail and a few words, too. Guidelines will be spelled out when we distribute the Call for Artists. The cut panels will be mounted on steel posts at levels appropriate for the subject matter. Two of the Hillwood Pathmates will go on each of four paths in the Hillwood Neighborhood.
