RE: King County Proposed Ordinance No. 2021-0267

The Metropolitan Solid Waste Advisory Committee (MSWAC) closely and effectively collaborated with the King County Solid Waste Division to update the Comprehensive Solid Waste Management Plan (Plan) that was successfully adopted by a majority of cities and the King County Council in 2019. The next update of the Plan will include a recommendation the long-term disposal choice after Cedar Hills is expanded and reaches its capacity.

At its January 2022 meeting, the Regional Policy Committee considered Proposed Ordinance No. 2021-0267 which would create an advisory committee to make recommendations about using Waste-to-Energy (WTE) technology for the disposal of the region's municipal solid waste.

MSWAC understands WTE is under consideration as one option for the next long-term disposal option. Over the years, at least two consultant studies have been analyzed the viability of WTE technology. While those studies were conducted by third party experts with deep insights to the subject matter, they did not reach the same conclusions. Nonetheless, it is undisputed that any disposal alternative will be more expensive than our current local management of waste at Cedar Hills Landfill.

Our region has come to recognize that our most pressing work is to divert the hundreds of thousands of tons of recyclable materials that are being buried - instead of channeled back into the economy. Doing so not only creates jobs and is beneficial to the environment but also reduces the burden on the next long term disposal option potentially save tens of millions of dollars.

This Proposed Ordinance was discussed during the January 2022 MSWAC meeting, and this committee unanimously voted to communicate with the King County Council that we are ready and able to provide advice on the next generation of disposal for King County in alignment with stated purpose of MSWAC in its Bylaws. The creation of an additional advisory committee for this purpose is not necessary.

We thank the Executive and County Council for considering our input as an advisory committee and would request you to take up the matter as soon as convenient.
