

Commendable Care & Compassion

We want to recognize MHPs Hartley, Townsend and others for the exceptional compassion they demonstrated on a detail this week at Shoreline's Quinn apartments. This excerpt from Sgt. Blanchette's BlueTeam commendation captures it best:

Monday, June 24th, Shoreline Deputies along with MHP's Melissa Hartley and Ruby Townsend were dispatched to the Quinn by Vintage Apartments for a suicidal male. The subject's girlfriend called 911 to report that the subject was making suicidal statements. The girlfriend was worried about the subject harming himself, she had all of the firearms removed from the home, and she collected all knives and other sharp objects and hid them in the apartment. The male was intoxicated and sitting in a bedroom by himself. The apartment was occupied by his girlfriend and their six children ages 2 to 15 years old. When Shoreline Deputies arrived, they contacted the subject in the bedroom, who was clearly depressed, and he appeared to have been drinking.

During the initial contact with the subject, he was closed off and not very talkative. The subject was adamant that he did not want to go to the hospital and wanted to leave for work. Over time, Deputies along with MHP Hartley and Townsend, were able to build rapport with the subject and convince him to walk to the ambulance in the parking lot below for a mental health evaluation. This was a peaceful resolution to an initially tense situation possibly involving firearms.

MHP Melissa Hartley played a pivotal role in this case. With several deputies and MHP Townsend in the apartment speaking with the subject, she recognized the importance of connecting with the reporting party (girlfriend) and the six children in the home. The children were very energetic and curious about the police officers in their apartment and why they were talking to their father. Melissa reassured the subject's girlfriend, and she was able to gather helpful information on the family dynamic and the struggles the subject was having, especially details he did not want talk about with deputies. Melissa also played with the children occupying their attention, she even let them paint her fingernails. The children were happy playing with her, and she helped lower the stress level in the home.


After the subject walked out of the apartment with deputies, she took it upon herself to buy pizza for the girlfriend and her children. Melissa filled a necessary role on this call, keeping the family calm and keeping their attention focused on much less stressful things. Melissa's kind and caring nature toward the children was invaluable. Melissa should be commended for her excellent work in this case.
