Honoring Edwin Pratt

On January 30th, Chief Collins, Captain Angelo, Detective Sergeant Fitchett, and Shoreline leaders attended the second annual Edwin T. Pratt Day of Remembrance at Shoreline Community College, honoring Pratt's work for equal housing and education.



Pratt, his wife, and their five-year-old daughter lived at 17916 1st Avenue NE in Shoreline, one of only two Black families in the area. On January 26, 1969, two unidentified men fatally shot him at his doorstep. The case remains unsolved.

A few days after the tragedy, Seattle's acting Mayor Floyd Miller declared January 30th a public day of mourning, ordering flags to fly at half-staff and urging attendance at a memorial service at Saint Mark's Cathedral.

In 2023, Detective Sgt. Scott Fitchett, with the support of others, revived the event. The commemoration continued in 2024 with a large gathering organized in collaboration with the City of Shoreline and Shoreline Community College.

This year's event, attended by over ninety guests, celebrated Pratt's legacy and included the presentation of the Edwin Pratt Scholarship to nursing student Catherine Nganga. Over the past four years, more than \$13,000 in scholarships have been awarded to seven Shoreline students.
