Happy Friday Shoreline PD,

I only have a couple of things to put out this week. Some of you may have heard the rumor that KCSO is looking to provide contract services to the city of North Bend. This rumor is true. KCSO and North Bend have agreed to an Interlocal Agreement (ILA) that will provide a sergeant as chief of police, one detective, and ten deputies for a total of 12 FTEs. The agreement is slated to begin in 18 months. Adding revenue-based FTEs to the Sheriff's Office is always a good thing. Additionally, this will help Shoreline in the long run by further spreading out the costs to provide police services to our contracts, including us, and reducing the costs for all contracts.

We are rapidly approaching the end of the first half firearms qualification period. There are three qualification dates left. Unfortunately, the only date left that has availability is June 20th. I have been told no other dates will be added. If you are not qualified and you are not signed up, get signed up ASAP.
