1) With new deputies and the new radios, deputies need to wait after keying the mike up before speaking. The dispatchers aren't hearing the beginning of most transmissions as it's being cut off. Please share to have them wait a second before they start talking.

2) With so many cars on any given air, please reinforce that people need to use their full call signs. There are often two of the same call signs in use and we need the shift designator first for accuracy. So it's 2F12, 4A6, etc.

3) Please ensure that everyone is checking their PERQ command when the prompt comes out. Some people are still missing portable radio numbers or have the wrong ones listed. They should also check their phone numbers.

Please try and adhere to these guidelines. It appears it will make your dispatcher's life easier. That's all for now.
