Adam Foley is a Crisis Responder with the RCR team and brings nearly a decade of experience working across the spectrum of mental and behavioral health. He holds a master's degree in counseling and has worked in a wide range of settings, including juvenile justice, wilderness therapy, outpatient behavioral health, crisis stabilization, and residential programs—spanning both public and private sectors.

Most recently, Adam worked at Deschutes County's Stabilization Center in Bend, OR, where he supported individuals experiencing acute mental and behavioral health crises through a co-response model for calls received via 911. Crisis intervention and de-escalation have been consistent through-lines across his work, including serving as a crisis response and de-escalation trainer in high-acuity, multidisciplinary settings. His approach emphasizes collaborative engagement with law enforcement, comprehensive assessment, and connecting individuals to appropriate community and medical resources.

Adam values relationship-centered, trauma-informed care and views co-response as a critical bridge between public safety and behavioral health systems. He is committed to supporting officers in the field while ensuring individuals and families receive thoughtful, dignified, and effective crisis care.
